Martin's Message:

A frequently asked question is "Why is your lily production down this time of year?" The main reason is that here in Oregon, our summers are warm and dry all the way until early fall. By the middle to end of October, the weather changes from sunshine and temperatures in the 80's, to cloudy, showery weather and 50-60 degrees. The change

can be quite sudden, resulting in lower flower production.

We make up for this slow down by planting more bulbs for this time of year and turning on the heat and grow lights. However, it takes the plants some time to adjust to the changes (We can only fool "Mother Nature" so much).

I feel over the years, we have become more consistent and reliable with our quality, consistency and timing of our crop, but still we deal with a live product and weather conditions are difficult to predict.
